Residents of Wood County and the surrounding area know they can depend on Wood County Hospital to lead the way to better health. "I'm thrilled with what Wood County Hospital has accomplished. The Cancer Care Center is a tremendous resource for area residents. The Center houses the best technology in a setting designed to relieve the patients' stress and anxiety," said Robert Lavey, MD, radiation oncologist and medical director of the Cancer Care Center. "We recognize that a patient's emotional state affects their ability to overcome cancer. When you are diagnosed with cancer, your life is thrown into an uproar. Providing comfort and establishing the patient's control over their care and circumstances improves their therapy experience and their chance of a positive outcome,"

"Providing oncology services in a community hospital setting like Wood County, allows us to treat the patients with high-tech, state-ofthe-art standards and a level of personal care



that makes the patient feel secure in their treatment," said David Brown, MD, medical oncologist at the Cancer Care Center.

The Cancer Care Center, located in the medical office building adjacent to the hospital, has its own exterior entrance and a dedicated parking area. At 7,000-square-feet, the facility has a gleaming glass exterior and a comforting, nature-themed interior. The radiation therapy treatment room is enhanced by a virtual skylight and four virtual windows surrounding the patient in a tranquil, tropical environment. Wood-grained flooring and a patient-controlled stereo music system expand the comforting atmosphere of the radiation therapy suite.

The medical oncology infusion center is equipped with a reclining lounge chair and charging station for a laptop or tablet for each patient. Two full walls of windows bring in natural light and pleasant outdoor scenery for patient relaxation and enjoyment during chemotherapy and supportive treatments.

The Cancer Care Center utilizes technology that is second to none, including the first Varian TrueBeam System 2.0 Linear Accelerator and the first Toshiba Acquilion large-bore CT scanner in Ohio. This multimillion dollar investment in the finest technology available provides our dedicated radiation oncologist, radiation physicist, and radiation dosimetrist team the unsurpassed power to design and deliver the optimum customized treatment to each patient.

"We take advantage of the utmost 4-dimensional capabilities of the Aquilion LB

and TrueBeam 2.0 to create individualized radiation therapy schemes that most precisely concentrate our radiation dose within the patient's tumors and spare their healthy tissue from damage. This combination goes beyond anything I've seen in 25 years of practicing in major university cancer centers throughout the country," said Dr. Lavey. "The new scanner gives the patient more space and the physician better opportunity to optimally position the patient than any other facility in Ohio. It also creates videos showing the exact movement of the tumor and vital organs as the patient breathes instead of just the frozen images standard CT scanners produce, allowing us to focus radiation on the entire tumor and only the tumor. This increases the probability of eliminating the tumor and avoiding side effects."




Robert S. Lavey, MD, MPH

n organization of more than 600 men and women committed to the mission of Wood County Hospital and the patients it serves marked its remarkable 60th anniversary.

Since its formation the Guild has donated more than \$1 million dollars to the hospital through equipment purchases, room and department renovations, material acquisitions to help establish new programs and many other items that enhance the overall patient experience.

WCH Foundation provides powerful new equipment for Cancer Care Center

he war on cancer at the Wood County Hospital Cancer Care Center is poised to advance to a new level with the acquisiton of breakthrough technology being made possible by the Wood County Hospital Foundation.

The Foundation's Board of Trustees approved a significant \$535,000 to purchase the Toshiba Aquilion Large Bore CT Scanner, the first of its kind in Ohio. The new CT Scanner will be used by the radiation oncology team for mapping out radiation therapy treatments as well as for interventional procedures.

"The CT Scanner, used in tandem with the Varian TruBeam Linear Accelerator, will provide our dedicated radiation oncologist, radiation physicist, and radiation dosimetrist team unsurpassed power to design and deliver the optimum customized treatments to each patient," said Dr. Robert Lavey, medical director of the Cancer Care Center.

The large bore CT Scanner offers greater precision in oncology planning through improved CT simulation positioning, every time for every patient, without compromise, and covering more anatomy with greater accuracy.

To make this powerful new tool available to benefit Wood County and other NW Ohio residents, the WCH Foundation has embarked on a \$1 million Cancer Care Center campaign, for which \$300,000 in pledges have already been secured.

Wound Healing Center achieves results to improve people's lives

typical day repairing antique tractors on his Rudolph, Ohio farm changed dramatically for Tay Yarger in 2013 when a 700 pound axle fell, crushing his right foot.

Rushed to Wood County Hospital, orthopedic surgeon Dr. Scott Deering surgically repaired his wounds, but believed Yarger would lose his toes.

Dr. Deering referred Yarger to WCH's Wound Healing Center for hyperbaric oxygen treatment (HBO). "I thought that increasing the delivery of oxygen to his injured foot would help the healing process and possibly salvage his toes...and it worked great."

Dr. Todd Tamlyn, medical director of the Wound Healing Center, said, "We don't usually see crush injuries in our outpatient setting, and Mr. Yarger's case was as significant as we have seen."

Yarger received 40 treatments at the WCH Wound Healing Center over five months, along with physical therapy treatments in WCH Rehabilitation Services, conveniently located in the same building. He is now able to walk normally on his previously severely injured foot.

"It's unbelievable how HBO healed my foot," Yarger said. "It was great to receive all my treatment and therapy locally. The staff at Wood County Hospital are terrific. They bent over backwards to help me, and we became like family."

Yarger's story is just one example of the life-changing successes generated within the



Center, which marked its fifth anniversary this January.

The WCH Wound Healing Center has a healing success rate of 98% of wounds treated in 14 weeks or less, which far exceeds national standards. Furthermore, patient satisfaction scores were at 96% last year.

"The majority of wounds have a big impact on the patient's lifestyle. Our goal is to bring them back to a normal lifestyle so they can pursue their prior activities," Dr. Tamlyn said. "Patients come to the WCH Wound Healing

wounds as well as wounds secondary to chemotherapy and radiation treatment."

Treatment of a wound following surgery and radiation therapy is exactly what brought Sharon Keller of Defiance to the Wound

Healing Center. Mrs. Keller had a lumpectomy and radiotherapy for breast cancer, and her surgical site would not heal because of deep tissue injury.

Her wound treatment consisted of HBO, a special dressing and Wound VAC Therapy, a device which provided negative pressure to help draw the edges of her wound together, removing fluids and infectious materials, enhancing circulation while promoting tissue formation.

Ms. Keller, who made the 100 mile trip five days a weeks for 13 weeks to receive a total of 60 treatments. Following treatment she only had a small impression at the site of the wound.

"I couldn't have wished for a better staff at the Wound Healing Center. The wound would never

have healed without HBO and Wound VAC Treatment," she said, adding that following her treatments she intended to resume her water aerobics class.

Another Wound Healing Center patient pleased with his treatment is 81-year-old Bill Copley of Lindsay.

Mr. Copley had second degree burns over 78% of his body from a 1975 fire. Although his legs between his knees and ankles did not require skin grafts, he had scar tissue and developed ulcers there, resulting in several unsuccessful treatments for his wounds over a seven-year period.

He came to the Wound Healing Center in 2012 and saw improvement in his injuries over the course of debridements, compression and 60 HBO treatments administered five times a week for 2.5 hours a day.

"We had done everything else without good results," Mr. Copley said. "If you have been going to the same place for any length of time, pursue a change. The WHC staff are a wonderful bunch of people."

"We use a wide variety of treatment modalities, ranging from dressings and debridement to hyperbaric oxygen treatment therapy," Dr. Tamlyn said. "Our physicians and staff are trained and certified in wound care, and most of the equipment we use would not be found in a primary care physician's office."

People needing the services of the Wound Healing Center can be referred by their primary care doctor, by a hospital, or they can schedule their own appointment. Treatment is covered by health insurance companies, and Medicare and Medicaid. The Center's phone number is 419-373-7680.
